I admit to feeling some nostalgia as this is my eighth year out of the classroom since I retired in 2015. I loved teaching history in the classroom and interacting with eager young minds. There were many personal reasons I decided to leave my profession. And Covid-19 wasn't even a factor at that time!

Teaching is one of the most worthwhile things I've ever done and, at the same time, challenging and occasionally overwhelming. I have profound respect for every one of our educators who give of themselves to educate our children. Many of them have done so in less-than-ideal circumstances.

I was closing one door without knowing what the future would hold. Like many of you, I wondered what I would do in retirement. I thought I might teach online, but I rejected that idea because what I loved about teaching was the classroom contact with students. Teaching online would have given me less of that and more of the mountain of paperwork that comes with teaching a subject like history. I do have hobbies. I love reading, arts and crafts, baking, doing genealogy research, etc. But these are largely solitary pursuits and I didn't feel like I was quite ready for a rocking chair on the porch just yet. One of my best friends,



and former colleagues, Ann Sauberman, had encouraged me to join AAUW for several years, but I thought I was too busy at the time to commit to it. However, I joined AAUW almost immediately. I'm grateful to be actively involved with such an active branch. I am constantly inspired by your dedication to making our lives richer.

Our branch provides opportunities for us to gather as friends and associates to enjoy discussions, lectures, movies, and books, to express our ideas, to assist other women to succeed, and to participate in our political process as educated and active voters. Our first meeting of the year will highlight the role of black and white women in the struggle for equality after the passage of the 19th Amendment. Our participation is, in large part, their legacy. It took a community of like-minded women to work together to address their concerns over gender-based qualifications in order to vote on matters that concern everyone.

What matters to so many AAUW members is a commitment to bettering the lives of others and giving women a voice and a future. Like-minded women join AAUW to collaborate with their communities in order to bring about change. Accomplishing many things as individuals is difficult and challenging, but when we women work in groups, we can make a difference. One of AAUW's big initiatives is to work with the League of Women Voters to "Get Out the Vote." How can you help? You can volunteer to register voters. Please email her if you would like to participate and receive the cards and instructions.


September Program – Distinguished Author Featured – Live Meeting

Springfield-Annadale's first program meeting for the 2022-2023 membership year will be held at Pohick Regional Library, 6450 Sydenstricker Road, Burke, at 1:00 P.M. on Saturday, **September 17**. The guest speaker, author Elisabeth Griffith, earned her PhD from The American University with an undergraduate degree from Wellesley College. She has been a Kennedy Fellow at Harvard's Institute of Politics and a Klingenstein Fellow at Columbia Teachers College. Dr. Griffith has spent her career working for women's rights as an activist and an academic, teaching women's history at the secondary and college level and

has written for *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and professional journals. She is currently teaching courses in women's history at the Smithsonian Associates and Politics & Prose. She is the author of *In Her Own Right: The Life of Elizabeth Cady Stanton*, which was the inspiration for Ken Burns' PBS documentary, *Not For Ourselves Alone*.

Dr. Griffith will discuss her latest book, *Formidable*, which chronicles the efforts of white and Black women to advance sometimes competing causes. In this riveting narrative, Dr. Griffith integrates this fight to achieve equality.

Signed copies of *Formidable* will be available for purchase after the meeting. This is a community event - all are welcome.

Get Out the Vote activities with the League of Women Voters

One major activity we can do is to help staff voter registration drives.

In conjunction with National Voter Registration Day, on **September 20**, (1:00- 4:30 P.M.) there will be LWV-sponsored voter registration and voter information in-person events at all branches of Fairfax County Public Library. Volunteers are asked to commit to at least a 2-hour shift. AAUW members can sign up at https://www.signupgenius.com/go/20f0d48afa82fa7f94-national2. There will be a place to designate AAUW affiliation once a member has signed up. Those volunteering will be notified of a Zoom pre-event orientation.


Note this: Before participating in any voter registration event, members must complete training via this link https://www.elections.virginia.gov/registration/registration-drives/voter-registration-training-video/. It's pretty quick to complete the training and be added to the State Department of Elections list of individuals who can participate in third-party voter registration drives. Members who completed training in previous years are required to retake training for 2022.

<u>Reclaim Our Vote</u>: The Springfield-Annandale Branch will again be supporting "Reclaim Our Vote" which works to reach under-represented voters, i.e., voters who may vote in presidential elections, but not otherwise. Here's what to do:

- Go to: www.lettersagainstisolation.com/
- · Read through this marvelous website
- Sign up online

Then you:

- · Open the link to the database
- Select the facilities you plan to write to
- Handwrite the letter and mail it!
- At the end of each month, tell Judy Titterton <u>Judy.Titterton2@gmail.com</u> how many letters you
 have sent out for reporting to the Board

What to write about:

- Say where you are writing from; what is going on where you live, etc.
- A funny thing that happened to you or someone you know; a sweet memory, etc.
- Add jokes, puns, funny sayings, quotes, etc.
- Use colorful stationery, colored pens and pencils, crayons, highlight markers, stickers, stamping, colored envelopes, postcards, notecards

What not to write about:

- Do not solicit. Do not send gifts.
- Stay neutral in your letters. Don't discuss politics.
- · Don't refer to religious holidays, Mother's Day, Father's Day.




