I was excited to watch these young men and, especially, young women succeed and go on to college and future success. But we know that higher education is proving too costly for many deserving students. This is why part of AAUW's mission is to provide grants and scholarships. When you volunteer to help us with fund raising activities, you are helping someone else to achieve.

Yes, I enjoy our AAUW sponsored activities like going to the movies, lunches, and meetings with likeminded intelligent women. In 2022, we had some truly remarkable meetings thanks to many of you, and with a great deal of effort from our branch Co-Vice Presidents for Programs, Ann Sauberman and Irene McGhee. We are starting 2023 with plans for more engaging meetings with speakers who will inspire and inform us. Recently, I've become increasingly aware of public policy and supporting those who make

We can become active in our efforts to ensure that women have equal rights and opportunities. It's a good time to make this one of the firsts for 2023.

2013 The US military removes a ban against women serving in combat positions.

2016 Hillary Clinton becomes the first woman to receive a presidential nomination from a major political party.

2021 Kamala Harris is sworn in as the first woman and the first woman of color elected vice president of the United States.



January Program Meeting – Virtual

On Saturday, January 21, 1:00 P.M., via Zoom, Mary Buckingham Lipsey, a noted local historian, will speak about her book, "Almost Forgotten Women: Yesterday's Headliners, 1840-1940".

Almost Forgotten Women: Yesterday's Headliners *includes the stories of* over 60 women between the years of 1840 and 1940 who made a difference. The stories come from their own words, legal documents, and news articles from their times. These diverse women were famous as contributors in a man's world and making a real difference in their fields.

Mary Buckingham Lipsey was born in Atlanta, Georgia and raised in Fairfax County, Virginia. She received a B.A. in History and Sociology from Mary Washington College, and a Masters in Middle School Education from Virginia Tech. In June 2003, Mary retired after teaching seventh grade American History for nearly thirty years.

Ms. Lipsey has been a volunteer docent for the American History Museum of the Smithsonian since 1980, and for the National Archives since 2004. She is a member of the Fairfax County History Commission. Her interest in local history has found an outlet through writing articles and speaking to community groups. She became interested in aviation when her elementary school teacher wheeled a television into the classroom to watch astronaut Alan Shephard's first flight. During her teaching career, Mary was frustrated by how little women's history was included in the curriculum. Mary wrote the book *Almost Forgotten Women: Yesterday's Headliners* to educate persons of all ages about the accomplishments of women from the past and illustrate the women's struggle for equality.

Ms. Lipsey is a sought-out speaker for the Fairfax County Historical Society and will offer some stories infringing on our own neighborhoods. More hidden women! Watch your email inbox for an invitation.

Spring Fling Silent Auction



AAUW-VA State Lobby Day, Thursday, January 19

The Virginia General Assembly session opens for its short 45-day session on January 11, giving us many opportunities to advocate for legislative, policy, and budget priorities (attached at the end of this newsletter) that advance equity for women and girls in the Commonwealth. It is the strength of our united voices that gets the job done, so *we need every member helping in the ways they can*. We have circulated information to you from our state Vice Presidents for Public Policy.

We will kick off with a Pre-Session Public Policy Zoom meeting on **January 5** at 5:00 P.M. At this statewide gathering, you will learn how to advocate both in-person and virtually. We will introduce you to tools and resources that will be available to our members throughout the session, highlight issues to watch for, and provide updates on our in-person Lobby Day plans for January 19, as well as how you can participate virtually. *This is one meeting you will not want to miss.*

Passage of the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act, an AAUW Public Policy Priority

The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act requires employers to make reasonable accommodations to protect the health of pregnant workers, such as letting them carry bottles of water or take restroom breaks. This critical legislation passed the House of Representatives more than a year ago, but it was stalled in the Senate. On December 22, the Act finally was passed as part of the omnibus spending bill. Thanks to all who called or wrote their senators to urge their support for this landmark legislation.

The following report came from NBC News on December 22:


"After a years-long fight, Senators approved the inclusion of the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act as part of the omnibus, offering protections from discrimination for pregnant workers. The last-ditch effort was led by Sens. Patty Murray, D-Wash., Richard Burr, R-NC, Bill Cassidy, R-LA, and Bob Casey, D-PA.

"For far too long, too many workers excited about welcoming a new baby had to worry about losing their jobs — all because their employers could deny them basic, low-cost accommodations like a bathroom break or a stool to sit on," Murray said in a statement, calling the measure "a big and important step forward."

Another bill expanding accommodations for pumping in the workplace also passed as part of the tranche of amendments, cementing another victory for pregnant women and new moms. That measure was offered by Sens. Jeff Merkley, D-OR., and Lisa Murkowski, R-AK.

Murkowski called the amendment's passage "good progress toward ensuring no mother ever has to choose between a job and nursing her child."

A dashing young orator during the Great Hunger of the 1840s, Thomas Francis Meagher led a failed uprising against British rule, for which he was banished to a Tasmanian prison colony for life. But two years later he was "back from the dead" and in New York, instantly the most famous Irishman in America. Meagher's rebirth included his leading the newly formed Irish Brigade in many of the fiercest battles of the Civil War. Afterward, he tried to build a new Ireland in the wild west of Montana — a quixotic adventure that ended in the great mystery of his disappearance, which Egan resolves convincingly at last.

On February 2, the Evening Book Group will discuss *Born A Crime*, by Trevor Noah. Susan Burk is the scheduled reviewer.



- Make childcare affordable and readily available for all families
- Protect full access to voting
- Ensure full public-school funding and protect teachers from harassment and liability claims
