Not only will we be voting for state legislators, but also for the Board of Supervisors, the Sheriff, and other local officials. Our state and local officials affect our lives every day.

When I taught Government at Hayfield High School many years ago, I would explain to my students that of course we live near the Nation's Capital and are more aware of national news, but we need to study about the government in Richmond and in Fairfax County. Both the State and local government develop our education policy and budget, run our police and fire departments, build and maintain roads, and pass state and local laws. This is only a portion of their responsibility. It is essential as AAUW members that we concentrate on this very important 2023 Virginia election, which will choose both our state and local government representatives.

Join Susan Burk, our Public Policy Chair, at her home on Wednesday, **September 6**, 12:30 – 4:00 P.M. Susan is hosting a "postcard writing party." Our Branch is now committed to write 500 postcards for **Reclaim Our Vote** (ROV). ROV is a campaign from the non-partisan Center for Common Ground that focuses on registered but unrepresented voters, principally voters of color who don't usually vote in off year elections. The postcards, postage, instructions/scripts, labels will be available for pick up. Refreshments will be served. Many members have already signed up but everyone is invited. If you plan to attend, notify Susan so that she can have enough supplies.

Another option for members to get involved is the AAUW **Lobby Corps**. Since its formation in 1972, AAUW Lobby Corps volunteers have made in-person visits to Congressional offices on behalf of AAUW

members, supporting our national mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Lobby Corps stopped during the pandemic and years following January 6, 2021, but they already had one meeting during the summer and plan to resume meeting this fall. Personally, for at least 4 years, I enjoyed joining other AAUW members from Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia to study the issues and present the national AAUW position to either legislators or their representatives. There are many other ways that each of us can be involved in our Branch including two book groups, the movie group, and special activities that are advertised in *UPDATES* or by e-mail. There are also informative and enjoyable programs run by other local AAAUW Branches, who invite us to join. Both Cathie Boivin, (Co-President) and I hope to see you at many events this year.

Democracy is not a spectator sport

In her President's Message, Ann Sauberman has highlighted the importance of the upcoming November 7 election in Virginia. Its outcome will decide women's rights, education rights, voting rights and LGBTQ rights. AAUW and AAUW-VA are non-partisan, but political. The issues we have traditionally supported in Richmond and in Washington, including equity and economic security for women and families (e.g., pay equity, paid family and medical leave), a strong public education system, reduced impediments to voting, and women's access to healthcare, should be nonpartisan. Women's rights are human rights!

AAUW-VA Voter Guides

AAUW-VA's Co-Vice Presidents for Public Policy are enlisting volunteers to develop voter guides for the 40 seats in the Virginia Senate. If you are interested in helping with this effort, let me know. You should have received an email on this initiative with the templates for the guides. I am happy to resend it if you can't find it.

GOTV

Thank you to the 19 Branch members who volunteered to write postcards for Reclaim Our Vote, a campaign of the non-partisan Center for Common Ground that focuses on registered, but underrepresented voters, principally voters of color. As Ann mentioned, we have now committed to write 500 postcards, 200 more than our original 300 card commitment! We will meet on **September 6** to write postcards as a group at my house, 12:30-4:00 P.M. The combination of fellowship and active citizenship will be rewarding – guaranteed.



Voter Registration

National Voter Registration Day is **September 19**. This year, the League of Women Voters of the Fairfax Area will not be setting up voter registration tables at Fairfax County public libraries. I am working to get more information on what the League plans to do to register voters and will provide it when I receive it.

Welcome Back AAUW Lobby Corps

After nearly four years of hiatus, AAUW Lobby Corps is back on Capitol Hill. Lobby Corps traveled to Capitol Hill on July 27 to meet with lawmakers and urge them to support the Equal Rights Amendment. Since its formation in 1972, AAUW Lobby Corps volunteers have made tens of thousands of in-person visits to congressional offices on behalf of AAUW members and supporters placing a name and face to our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Lobby Corps volunteers are trained in how to effectively advocate AAUW's priority issues with members of Congress and their staff. Volunteers receive briefings on each issue topic before going on visits and new Lobby Corps volunteers are paired with experienced members. Capitol Hill lobby days are typically held once a month when Congress is in session. We understand that more visits are planned to advocate for passage for AAUW's policy priorities, including the Paycheck Fairness Act.

Several members of our Branch, including Sandy Lawrence, Marcy Leverenz, Irene McGhee, and Ann Sauberman have been members of Lobby Corps. Sandy participated in the July 27 event. Let her know if you are interested in joining future visits to the Hill. No experience or expertise is necessary - only a commitment to promoting AAUW's nonpartisan public policy priorities. If you're interested to learn more, AAUW National will be sharing information on two Zoom meetings, **September 14**, 9:30 A.M., and **September 21**, 7:00 P.M.

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AAUW was founded by Marion Talbot, who became the Dean of the College of Women at the University of Chicago and a leading figure in higher education, and Ellen Swallow Richards, the first woman to earn a degree in chemistry and a leader in the field of home economics. The year was 1881.

At that time, women faced significant barriers in accessing higher education and in pursuing jobs outside a limited number of fields. **AAUW**'s founding marked one of the first organized efforts to advance opportunities for women to pursue higher education and careers — and for equal treatment with men. Directions to the Beatley Central Library at 5005 Duke Street:

If you are heading East on Duke Street, you'll need to make a **left turn at the traffic light on North Pickett Street**, which is the street before you reach the library. There is a **CVS** on the corner. **After you turn and pass the two driveways for the CVS, turn right at the next driveway, where there is a small sign for the library.** You'll be in the library parking lot.

If you are heading West on Duke Street to reach the Beatley Central Library at 5005 Duke Street, you will be able to make a right turn into the library parking lot directly from Duke Street after you pass the library building on your right.
