Last July, while watching the Paris Olympics, I saw a Toyota commercial. It stressed that one of the most important lessons of the Olympics was the Power of Community. I thought about this each night as I watched the many venues: swimming, gymnastics, track and others. I realized that there were many communities represented. Each nation and each event were, in their own way, a community and it had its own power. The Power of Community also personifies AAUW. Both the Olympics and our AAUW are hierarchies of Community.



The Paris Olympics was comprised of many countries from all over the world.

Each has national spirit and pride, expressed with flags and special uniforms. They work so hard to compete for the gold, silver, and bronze. There is so much joy when they win, but they also celebrate the victories and accomplishments of their competitors. There are so many examples to demonstrate the Power of Community.

Simone Biles is an American champion gymnast. This was her fourth summer Olympics where she added three more gold metals and one silver to total eleven metals. During her career, she has had both amazing victories, but also great setbacks. In the 2020 Tokyo Olympics, Simone suffered the "twisties" and had to quit the competition. In the next four years she battled mental illness, worked hard, and set out again to return to gymnastics. Her power was to learn from her setbacks and help motivate other gymnasts like

The power of these gymnasts is to serve as examples to their team mates, and as role models to all those little girls, sitting at home, hoping to be future champions.



Katie Ledecky, a local champion swimmer, also became a legend this summer. At 27, she added two more gold and one silver to her many metals from four Olympics and world competitions. She, like Simone Biles, uses her power as a role model for so many young competitors in the United States and all over the world. Not only does she spend countless hours improving her strokes and stamina, but she also spends time motiving and inspiring others to help them compete. It was wonderful to see Katie Ledecky in the pool after a long race reaching out and hugging her fellow swimmers from many other countries.

The Power of Community is also evident at all three levels of the AAUW. The National AAUW, raises funds, formulates the main missions of the organization, and uses its power to advocate for important legislation that will fulfill its mission. Two examples of legislation are equal pay for women and paid leave. The National AAUW also gives out scholarships and grants to further women's education. At the State level, AAUW has its own power when it supports or rejects state legislation. It connects the many local branches together at state conventions and through Zoom meetings and publications. It also works with other organizations on combined projects to increase its power and influence. The last piece of the power hierarchy is the local Branch. Each Branch is unique and educates its members on important issues and motivates members to work on special projects. Our Springfield-Annandale Branch has monthly meetings, usually with a speaker about a current or important topic. In August, many of our members joined to write 500 postcards to get out the vote. We met at two member's homes for postcard-writing sessions. Many members finished the project at their homes. The Virginia State Branches are completing 4,000 plus postcards. The 2024 national election is essential and citizens need to vote. On each postcard, the voter will receive information on registration and early voting. This is an example of the Power of Community.

As our new AAUW year begins, I invite all of you to bring new members to our meetings so that we can increase the size of our community. Attend our meetings and work on Branch projects - your efforts will increase our power to accomplish our many goals.

I hope to see many of you at our September meeting. Read *UPDATES* each month for information on you can become more involved in Branch activities.

2024 White House Historical Society's Christmas Ornaments Have Arrived

This 2024 White House Christmas ornament commemorates Jimmy Carter, the 39th President of the United States. The distinctive anchor shape represents Carter's service in the U.S. Navy. He is the only President to have attended the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis.

The view of the North Portico features doves, a symbol of his peacemaking efforts which culminated in the Camp David Accords. The reverse side features the Seawolf-class USS Jimmy Carter submarine. Carter is the only President to have qualified in submarines. The globe signifies President Carter's life-long commitment to the environment as well as his efforts to secure world peace. He was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2002 for these efforts.

Your Vote is Your Voice!

The November election is barreling toward us. The results up and down the ballot will impact our AAUW policy priorities, as is evident from the candidates themselves. While we adhere strictly to our non-partisan principles, there are other ways to Get Out the Vote (GOTV). Thank you to all members who supported GOTV by writing postcards to voters in the Commonwealth for Reclaim Our Vote, an organization that reaches out to "underrepresented voters." This year, our Branch wrote 500 postcards and enjoyed gathering at postcard writing parties hosted by Debbie Gilligan and Cathie Boivin. Brava!!

There is no shortage of information on Virginia's voting procedures, so please make sure you are up-to-date.

VOTE411

Run by the League of Women Voters Education Fund (LWVEF), <u>Vote411.org</u> is a "one-stop-shop" for election related information. It provides nonpartisan information to the public with both general and state-specific information on the following aspects of the election process:

- Absentee ballot information
- Ballot measure information (where applicable)
- Early voting options (where applicable)
- Election dates
- Factual data on candidates in various federal, state, and local races
- General information on such topics as how to watch debates with a critical eye
- ID requirements
- Polling place locations
- Registration deadlines
- Voter qualifications
- Voter registration forms
- Voting machines

An important component of <u>Vote411.org</u> is the polling place locator, which enables users to type in their address and retrieve the poll location for the voting precinct in which that address is located.

In-Person Early Voting

Many of us opt to vote early in-person or via absentee ballot. It's an option that no longer requires an "excuse." Here's what you need to know if you are an in-person early voter:



- In-person early voting will be available from September 20 through November 2 for the November 5 General and Special Elections.
- Only Fairfax County registered voters may vote at any Fairfax County early voting location.
- Voters must present an acceptable ID or may sign an ID Confirmation Statement.
- Curbside voting is available for eligible voters.
- Absentee by mail voters may vote early in person if they choose. The deadline to request an absentee ballot is October 25. If you received a ballot in the mail, you must bring it with you and surrender it to vote in person. If you received a ballot but do not bring it with you, you may vote a provisional ballot. Mail ballot drop boxes are available during early voting location operating hours.
- Same-day registration is available between October 16 and November 2 at early voting locations. Voters submitting a same-day registration will vote a provisional ballot.
